1. Bronze Age Gold Basket Ornament

Location: Poulton Gold Hoard Case Prehistory Gallery 2500BC-2200BC

This item, possibly hair ornaments or ear rings, has been cut from thin gold sheet and would normally have been wrapped into a cylindrical 'basket' shape.

2. Late Bronze Age Axe Heads



- i) A Late Bronze Age socketed axe of the Yorkshire type
- ii) A Late Bronze Age socketed axe of the Meldreth type

These axes are part of the Yanworth Hoard.

3. Roman Gold Ear Ring



Location:

Cast gold annular ear ring discovered by a metal detector. Roughly sub rectangular with a lozenge-shaped cross-section. The ring is widest at its mid point. Both end points overlap by 5mm.

5. Anglo-Saxon Button

Saxons and Vikings Case Vikings Corridor

Early-Medieval

A gold fitting or button, consisting of a squashed, formerly domed, cap. It has moulded s-shaped interlace decorations around the outer ring. It was found in the sole of a child's welly!

4. Roman Silver Rings

100AD-400AD

- i) Guiraud Type silver finger ring. At either end of the bezel is a saltire cross. 100AD-300AD
- ii) Brancaster Type silver finger ring. The face of the bezel is decorated with the recessed image of a human head and shoulders. 300AD-400AD

6. Silver-gilt Crucifix

Religious Life Case Medieval Gallery

Late 14th to early 15th century

On the front Christ is suspended from the cross. On the reverse of the pendant is a figure of St Christopher, carrying the Christ Child

7. Silver-gilt Pendant

15th Century

Silver-gilt pendant with the three names of the Magi: CASPAR, MELCHIOR and BALTASAR engraved on alternating sides. On the intervening sides are decoration representing either teardrops or drops of blood.

8. Annular Brooch

Medieval Gallery

13th Century

This silver-gilt annular brooch is decorated with be a two large cat heads, a bull with horns and a monkey. The heads of the beasts are angled so that their cheeks are alongside the curl of the pin.

9. Three Rings

12th-17th Century

- i) Medieval finger ring decorated with a simple saltire cross. 12th century
- ii) Silver seal matrix ring with the letters TE.15th-16th century
- iii) Gold finger ring engraved with the inscription Heart content will not repent. Mid-17th century
